

National Bike to School Day 2014: Climbing to new heights

Thousands of students, families, school staff, law enforcement officers, advocates and many other supporters across the country took off on their bikes pedaling and shifting gears as a part of the third annual National Bike to School Day. In all, 2,222 schools registered Bike to School Day events – a 30% percent increase from 2013!

"We are thrilled to see the success of the third annual Bike to School Day," said Lauren Marchetti, director of the National Center for Safe Routes to School, which coordinates National Bike to School Day. "Participation for this event continues to grow and is all because of the enthusiasm and commitment of thousands of parents, school administrators, elected officials, students and community leaders."

Communities across the country celebrated National Bike to School Day by organizing helmet fittings, bicycle skills clinics and trail openings. They rode bicycles, skateboards, roller blades and at least one unicycle. Some communities wanted to show support without biking and so they walked. Regardless of how kids and adults used their feet, it was a day to celebrate traveling under your own steam.

Bike to School Day is a national event that gives communities across the country the opportunity to join together in bicycling to school on the same day. The event, an exciting celebration for those new to the experience as well as those who have been two-wheeling to school for years, is part of the movement for year-round safe routes to school, and encourages bicycling to school as a healthy way for kids and families to make their school commute.

National Bike to School Day adds to the excitement surrounding National Bike Month, led by the League of American Bicyclists each May. Based on the Walk to School Day model, Bike to School Day builds off the 18 years of success of International Walk to School Day. Recognition for the big day came from national level government officials, media and even celebrities. For the National Bike to School Day roll-out event in Washington D.C's Lincoln Park, more than 200 students from a dozen schools came together to celebrate biking. United States Department of Transportation Acting Deputy Secretary, Victor Mendez (pictured far right holding banner), and the Federal Highway Administration's Safe Routes to School Program Manager, Wesley Blount (pictured far left holding banner), helped send off students - some participating in their third Bike to School Day event, some participating for the first time – as they departed from the park in organized bike trains.

A big name in the entertainment business, Ellen DeGeneres, gave a Bike to School Day shout out on social media, tweeting "It's Bike to School Day! National Bike to School Day Helmets on Heads Bikeshare Giveaway

This year the National Center for Safe Routes to School partnered with Schwinn's Helmets on Heads program for the Bike to School Day Helmets on Heads Bikeshare Giveaway. Nine schools and one resource person each were awarded 10 bikes and 20 helmets in weekly drawings leading up to Bike to School Day and recognizing the close of Bike Month.

Two winners were selected during our Facebook drawing held on Bike to School Day. These schools responded to our Facebook question, "What would your school do with ten bikes and twenty helmets?" Washington Elementary School in Billings, Montana, was selected for their innovative plans to develop a bikeshare lend/lease program in collaboration with local churches, businesses and organizations to assist Timothy Ball enjoyed a successful first ride this year.
