participated. Four governors and dozens of mayors took part. Ribbons were cut for new sidewalks. Police officers taught about pedestrian safety and ticketed speeders near schools. Traffic was reduced for the day. Sixteen million people were exposed to the event in newspapers, plus

countless more through local television coverage. And, most importantly, hundreds of thousands of children walked to school safely.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Four governors and dozens of mayors participate.
- EPA releases study showing that school siting can affect traffic congestion, air pollution, and children's health and obesity.

LASTING IMPROVEMENTS

Walk to School Day brings together critical community coalitions that work toward safety improvements for pedestrians and increased physical activity. Here are some highlights of good things that are happening across the country.

Physical Activity & Nutrition

Organizers use Walk-to-School Day as kick-off event of a school program "committed to developing habits that promote optimal health, better food and lifestyle choices for children and preventing obesity."

Marston School Hampton, NH

Walk to School Day is part of a yearround program to improve fitness and nutrition. Others components include a health fair, after-school healthysnack cooking class, and on-going walking fitness activities.

> Towanda School District Towanda, Pennsylvania

Developed a **walking school bus** for students, linking younger children with older students and adults.

O'Neill Elementary O'Neill, Nebraska

Walk to School Day was the kick-off for a fit-for-life program that **pur-chased pedometers for students**.

West View Elementary Spartanburg, S.C.



Bethlehem, Pennsylvania

Developed an "Outdoor Walk and Learn Trail."

North Iowa Schools Thompson, Iowa

Started a **Walk Around the World Club** for students during recess and in the morning.

Lone Oak Elementary Spartanburg, S.C.

Encourage at least 30 minutes of physical activity each day, with the ultimate goal for the school being to accumulate "One Million Minutes of Motion."

AC Moore Elementary Columbia, S.C.

Since the majority of students cannot walk to school, we use Walk to School Day to kick-off a **year-round walking-at-recess program**.

Orchard Hollow Elementary Mentor, Ohio

Safer sidewalks & roadways

Crosswalks and appropriately timed traffic lights have been installed. City budget has tripled budget for sidewalk improvements, with the priority being school walking routes.

Garfield Elementary Olympia, Washington

Modernized crosswalk signals and repainted crosswalk.


Rozelle Elementary Cleveland, Ohio

> Washington Elementary Santa Ana, California

Parents successfully lobbied for a sidewalk to school.

Clemson Elementary Clemson, S.C.



City held ribbon-cutting on Walk to School Day to celebrate the completion of a new sidewalk connecting the elementary school with adjacent neighborhoods, part of the city's new sidewalk program to provide connectivity and safe walking routes to schools.

Root Elementary Fayetteville, Arkansas

Parents' walkability checklist to be used to advocate for traffic signal improvements, including a photoenforced light in front of school.

La Colima Elementary Whittier, California

City has asked state to **reduce speed limit in front of school** as a result of parents bringing issue to attention.

Markham Elementary Portland, Oregon

Because of participation in Walk to School Day in 2002, the school received a Safe Communities grant, which was used for pedestrian traffic signals.

Tice Elementary Lee County, Florida

County Recreation and Parks department resurfaced and widened one of the walking paths used by children walking to the school.

Centennial Lane Elementary Ellicott City, Maryland

School administration and parent group is working with civil engineering firm to make the **parking lot safer**.

Sherman Oaks Charter School San Jose, California Sixth graders made recommendations to the City Council which have since resulted in pedestrian improvements near the school.

These recommendations resulted from a service project that turned Walk to School Day into a weekly event using the Walkability Checklist.

Topa Topa Elementary Ojai, California

Policy Changes

Colorado health department announced several **new initiatives to increase physical activity in schools**, of which Walk to School Colorado is a cornerstone.

State of Colorado

Schools participating in Alabama School Walk have received \$8 million in school zone safety funds since 1999. Expenditures are based, in part, on parents walkability checklists that are forwarded to local traffic engineers and law enforcement.

State of Alabama

On Walk to School day, the New Jersey governor announced \$13 million in grants to improve street safety around schools and to build bike paths. Of this, \$6 million is designated to protect children on their way to and from school.

State of New Jersey

City requires new neighborhoods to be designed for pedestrians and is retrofitting old streets and sidewalks.



Media Summary

Media coverage of Walk to School Day was outstanding, with newspapers and local television stations demonstrating a willingness to commit staff and news space/time to Walk to School Day, both in promoting the event before it happens and covering the events of the day. Media coverage of events is important because it brings pedestrian safety and access issues to the attention of a broader community, which can create broader support for pedestrian-friendly planning policies and sidewalk and roadway improvements.

Newspapers alone reached a total circu-

lation of at least 16 million, according to a

review of newspapers in Lexis-Nexis Database. A search of all the general interest daily newspapers in the database showed 167 articles in 80 newspapers. Of those items, 31 percent were placed on newspaper section front pages, and after eliminating briefs and opinion pieces, which rarely are placed on section fronts, the percentage of front-page articles (including stand-alone photos) increases to an amazing 47 percent. It is worth noting that only one of the section

front stories did not include a photo.

Television coverage of the event is much more difficult to determine with accuracy. National networks tracked through Lexis Nexis did not reveal any articles in their transcripts, but a Google internet search of news sources shows that dozens of local television stations did report on the event.
