Record Numbers Come Together to Celebrate Biking and Highlight Safety

On May 10th, 2017, kids and adults across the country pedaled their way to school during the annual bike-powered celebration, National Bike to School Day. More students, parents, community leaders, and state and local officials than ever celebrated the sixth annual Bike to School Day.

In total, 3,003 schools in 49 states and D.C. registered events, setting an all-time high for National Bike to School Day participation. Half of this year's events were held at schools that have participated previously, showing how Bike to School Day can become an annual tradition for communities that give it a try.

Across the country communities bicycled and walked to school to promote safer routes to school and healthier habits. These events were community-led, taking place in small towns and large cities. Some celebrated with bike trains from home to school, others with bike safety events held on school campus during the day, and many schools met at nearby parks or other gathering places to ride to school as a group.

The National Bike to School Day event held in Washington D.C. hosted over 200 students from a dozen schools and included several special guests. D.C. Mayor Muriel Bowser (pictured to the right), D.C. Councilmember Charles Allen, the Capitol Hill Public School Parent Organization (CHPSPO), and the National Center for Safe Routes to

School were joined by representatives from the US Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration, the National Highway Traffic Safety Association, FIA Foundation, Safe Kids and others to help send off students as they departed from the park in organized bike trains.

This year, Bike to School Day coincided with UN Global Road Safety Week, an international campaign for road safety that focuses on speed management and improvements to reduce road traffic deaths and injuries worldwide. The Bike to School Day event in Capitol Hill recognized the shared goal of working to improve road safety, particularly by slowing down speeding vehicles.

This was a great community building event. The students loved walking together. We are a rural school so we had to be bused to a central location and walk the one mile to school from there.

Inspiring Change

Bike to School events can help encourage communities to implement policy or engineering changes that make it safer to walk and bike to school. In 2017, sixty-nine percent of event organizers indicated that their event had an impact on making a policy or engineering change.

TOP POLICY AND ENGINEERING CHANGES

22%

of all events led to the addition of bicycling/walking promotion to existing school policies (such as a school wellness policy). 22%

of all events led to the addition of bike racks.

of all events led to the addition of required safety education.
